

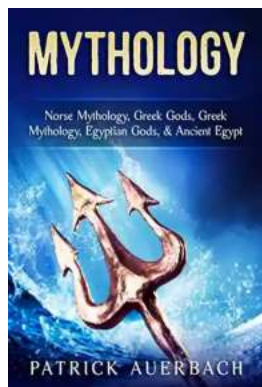

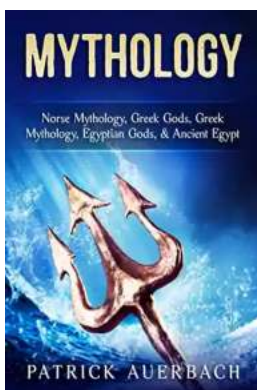

and political institutions of Ancient Greece and its civilization, and to gain understanding of the nature of myth-making itself.

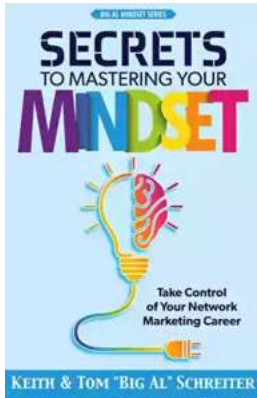
Egyptian Gods

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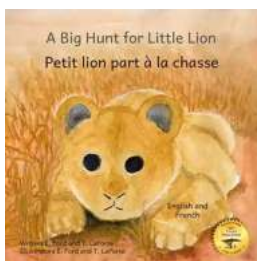
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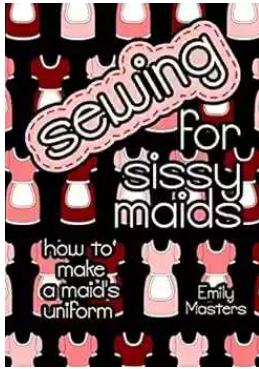
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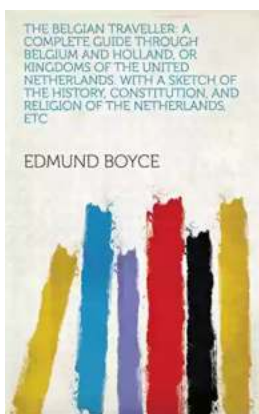
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
