

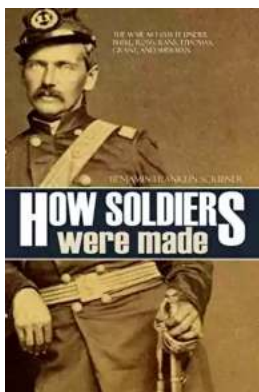

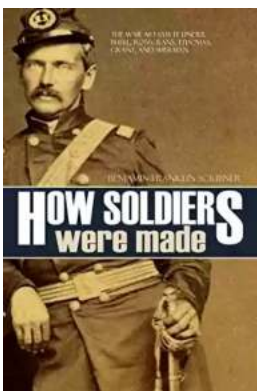

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The best memoirs of the American Civil War are those by soldiers who were in the thick of it, were observant, and who could really write. Benjamin Franklin Scribner was all three.

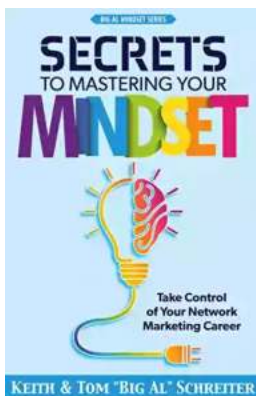

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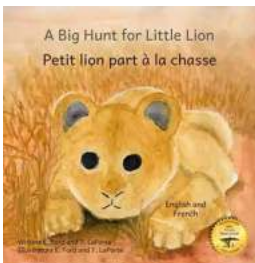
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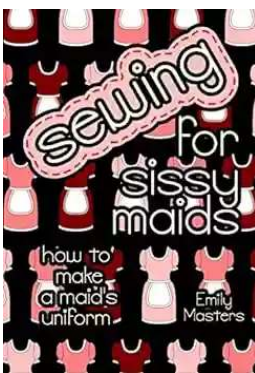
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
